Subject: Notification of Time Limit Extension Request for the Federal Impact Assessment Process of the Marten Falls Community Access Road Project

The Impact Assessment Agency of Canada (the Agency) received a request for a time limit extension, for the federal impact assessment process of the Marten Falls Community Access Road Project (the Project). A copy of the request is enclosed with this letter and is available on the Canadian Impact Assessment Registry internet site: <https://iaac-aeic.gc.ca/050/evaluations/proj/80184>

Marten Falls First Nation has requested an extension to the time limit of the impact statement phase until July 24, 2026, in order to provide the required information or studies described in the Tailored Impact Statement Guidelines issued for the Project.

The request (Enclosure 1) describes Marten Falls First Nation's progress in developing their Impact Statement, and includes a work plan that illustrates when outstanding work would be completed. Enclosure 2 provides useful links to Marten Falls First Nation's project website pages, where plain-language resources, such as videos describing their approach to baseline data collection, are available.

Participation

The Agency invites Kashechewan First Nation to provide input to inform the Agency's consideration by December 9, 2022. The Agency in its preliminary review of the extension request notes Marten Falls First Nation's information related to:

- timelines to engage with Indigenous communities;
- future engagement activities with Indigenous communities to share information and hear community views on key topics, such as

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- how comments and Indigenous knowledge were incorporated;
- baseline conditions and data collection, including selection of valued components and indicators, and approach to fieldwork;
- the effects assessment, including mitigation measures, follow-up programs and cumulative effects assessment; and
- potential impacts on the exercise of Aboriginal and Treaty rights.

Context

In accordance with subsection 19(1) of the *Impact Assessment Act*, Marten Falls First Nation must provide the Agency the information or studies that are set out in the Notice of the Commencement for the Project by February 24, 2023.

Under subsection 19(2) of the *Impact Assessment Act*, upon request from Marten Falls First Nation, the Agency may extend the time limit by any period that is necessary for Marten Falls First Nation to provide the Agency with the information or studies. Further, subsection 20(1) indicates that the federal impact assessment for the Project would be terminated, if Marten Falls First Nation does not provide the information or studies by February 24, 2023, or within any granted time limit extension.

Next Steps

Once the Agency decides whether to grant the request to extend the time limit of the impact statement phase, the Agency will post a notice on the Canadian Impact Assessment Registry internet site for the Project and will notify your community in writing.
