





INTRODUCTION TO FEDERAL IMPACT ASSESSMENTS AND PROVINCIAL ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENTS





Federal Impact Assessments

- Impact assessments are planning, and decision-making tools used to assess the potential positive and negative effects of proposed projects.
- Federal assessments consider a wide-range of factors including environmental, health and socio-economic effects of the project and impacts on the rights of Indigenous people, need and purpose of the project, alternative means of carrying out the project, accidents and malfunctions, cumulative effects.
- Impact assessments are led by the Impact Assessment Agency of Canada (the Agency) or independent review panels. They can also be led collaboratively with other jurisdictions or federal regulators such as the Canada Energy Regulator.




The British Columbia Environmental Assessment Office (EAO)

Purpose of the EAO

The EAO conducts reviews of **major** projects and administers the *Environmental Assessment Act* (2018), through:

- promoting sustainability by protecting the environment and fostering a sound economy and the well-being of British Columbians and their communities; and
- supporting reconciliation with Indigenous peoples in British Columbia.









Impact Assessment

Agency of Canada

Cooperation between the Agency and EAO

In accordance with the *Impact Assessment Cooperation Agreement Between Canada and British Columbia*, the Agency and EAO have been cooperating to:

- Coordinate timelines, including joint comment periods
- Engage with Indigenous nations and the public
- Develop joint products, including the:
 - Joint Guidelines,
 - Joint Assessment Plan,
 - Joint Indigenous Engagement and Partnership Plan, and
 - Joint Permitting / Regulatory Coordination Plan
- Provide joint feedback to the proponent on documents
- Each government will retain the power to make their own decisions regarding the project

Past Milestones

- September 28, 2020 Acceptance of Initial Project Description
- December 23, 2020 Summary of Issues (following public consultation)
- October 19, 2021 The Agency receipt of Detailed Project Description
- October 28, 2021
 - Agency decision an impact assessment is required
 - EAO readiness decision the project will proceed to an environmental assessment
- **November 3, 2021** federal Minister referred the impact assessment to a review panel


DP4 assessment referred to a review panel

- On November 3, the federal Minister of Environment referred the assessment for the project to a review panel.
 - Reasons include potential for adverse effects within federal jurisdiction, public concerns, potential impacts to Indigenous peoples and their rights, and opportunities for cooperation with British Columbia.
- A review panel is a group of independent experts appointed by the Agency to conduct an impact assessment (i.e. collect information, conduct hearings, write the report).
- The EAO intends to principally rely on the federal review panel's impact assessment to meet the provincial requirements for an environmental assessment

Next Steps



November 10, 2021 – January 7, 2022 - Comment period on draft Joint Guidelines and Joint Assessment Plan



- April 16, 2022 Final joint guidelines, process order and plans issued to the proponent on or before this date.
- **Summer 2022** Comment period on the project-specific cooperation agreement and review panel terms of reference
- Later in the process Review of the impact statement and start of the review panel process






Public Engagement

Future public comment periods will include:

The review panel will also conduct hearings and may provide additional opportunities for engagement.









Federal Participant Funding Program (PFP)


- Promotes the involvement of the public and Indigenous nations in participation activities.
- Agency has already awarded funding for the planning phase, which includes this ongoing comment period.
- Members of the public and Indigenous nations will have another opportunity to apply for federal funding to facilitate their participation in the later phases of the assessment process, including the review panel hearings.

JOINT GUIDELINES





Joint Guidelines

- Drafted and tailored for the project jointly by the Agency and the EAO
- The purpose of the Joint Guidelines is to identify for the proponent the minimum information requirements for the impact statement
- A final version of these Joint Guidelines which reflects the input received and will be issued to the proponent at the end of the Planning Phase.
- Comment period on the draft joint guidelines ends on January 7, 2022
- Final Joint Guidelines and plans issued by April 16, 2022







Joint Guidelines



Comment period on the Joint Guidelines November 10, 2021 to January 7, 2022.

Please consider the following when drafting your comments. These questions can be found in the public comment period supporting documents on the Registry and EPIC.

For example, tell us:

- What components of the environment, health, social, cultural or economic conditions are important to you or your community, and why are they important?
- What locations are of importance to you and your community, why are they important, and how could they be impacted by the project?
- What should the spatial boundaries be for the assessment of impacts resulting from physical activities associated with the project, such as marine shipping incidental to the project, and road and rail activities?
- Are there other issues you would like to see addressed in the Joint Guidelines?





Valued Components

For each category, the proponent must identify:

Factors to be Assessed

- Project Purpose, Need and Alternatives Considered
- Cumulative effects
- Indigenous and Community Knowledge
- Impacts on Indigenous Interests
- Effects of the Environment on the Project
- Accidents and Malfunctions
- Contribution to Sustainability (including assessment on Current and Future Generations)

- Canada's Ability to Meet its
 Environmental Obligations and Climate
 Change Commitments
- Biophysical Factors that Support Ecosystem Function
- Human and Community Well-being (including culture)
- Gender Based Analysis Plus (GBA+)







Geographic Extent of Activities

- The Agency and EAO are also **seeking comments on the geographic extent** of the following activities related to the project:
 - Marine shipping incidental to the project beyond the 12 nautical mile limit of the territorial sea of Canada
 - Road transportation beyond the proponent's lease boundary
 - Rail transportation beyond the proponent's lease boundary
- The final determination of the geographic extent of these activities will be reflected in the final Joint Guidelines in consideration of the comments received.



JOINT ASSESSMENT PLAN





Draft Joint Assessment Plan

- Prepared jointly by the Agency and EAO
- The purpose of the Joint Assessment Plan is to outline for each phase of the assessment:
 - How the federal and provincial governments will cooperate;
 - The assessment process, participation opportunities and general timelines; and
 - Roles and responsibilities of assessment participants.
- It is intended to be high-level to allow the Agency, EAO or the review panel to supplement the approaches described in this plan to accommodate changes that may occur during the assessment.



Communication and Participation Tools

 - What communication and participation tools would facilitate your participation?
 - Are there any challenges that you or your community are facing that would prevent you from taking part in the project's public participation opportunities?

 - The Agency and EAO are seeking comments from federal and provincial authorities on the contents of the Joint Permitting Plan.



Assessment Process









Impact Statement Development and Review Phase

Mains steps include

- develop a project-specific cooperation agreement and the review panel terms of reference and consult on those;
- proponent prepares and submits the impact statement;
- review panel is appointed;
- review of the impact statement to determine if it contains all the information and studies required by the joint guidelines;
- consensus-seeking with participating Indigenous nations on the impact statement.





Impact Assessment Phase led by the Review Panel (Part 1)

The main objectives of the review panel are to:

- verify the information in the impact statement and gathers any additional information the review panel needs to fulfill its terms of reference;
- conduct hearings;
- prepare the impact assessment report and submit the report to the federal Minister;
 and
- the review panel may be directed to draft conditions and consult on them.





Impact Assessment Phase led by Governments (Part 2)

Federal steps include:

- if the review panel is not directed to develop draft conditions, the Agency will take into consideration the review panel's impact assessment report and develop recommendations on potential federal conditions
- Agency will hold a comment period on draft conditions
- if the review panel is mandated to develop draft conditions, the Agency will review these conditions and determine whether modifications are needed. If modifications are made, the Agency will hold a comment period on the potential conditions
- taking into consideration comments received from the comment period, the Agency will
 update the potential conditions and issue recommendations on the potential federal
 conditions to the federal Minister.





Impact Assessment Phase led by Governments (Part 2)

Provincial steps include:

- Based on the impact assessment report submitted by the review panel, the EAO will develop a draft provincial referral package, including draft EAC conditions and project description, a provincial referral package, and recommendations
- The EAO will hold a comment period on the provincial referral package



Federal Decision-making Phase

- Federal decision-making begins when the Agency posts its recommendations to the federal
 Minister of Environment and Climate Change regarding federal conditions on the public registry
 and ends when the federal decision is communicated publicly.
- The legislated federal timeline for this part of the assessment is 90 days.
- Federal steps include:
 - Governor-in-council decision on whether the project's adverse effects within federal jurisdiction are in the public interest
 - Federal Minister issues a decision statement with detailed reasons and, if approved, the federal conditions for the project that the proponent must comply with
 - Where applicable, the Government of Canada issues a response to the review panel's recommendations that relate to federal mandates and interests





Provincial Decision-making Phase

- Begins when the EAO submits a provincial referral package to provincial Ministers.
 - The provincial Ministers issue or refuse to issue an EAC which includes provincial conditions and a project description
 - The provincial Ministers publish reasons for a decision
 - Where applicable, B.C. issues a response to the review panel's recommendations that relate to provincial mandates and interests
- The legislated provincial timeline for this part of the assessment is 30 days.





Post-Decision Phase

If the project is approved federally:

- The federal Minister would require the proponent to substantially begin to carry out the project within a certain period set out in the federal decision statement.
- The Agency would post follow-up and monitoring documents to the Registry. Compliance and potential enforcement activities would also be posted to the Registry.



Post-Decision Phase

If a provincial Environmental Assessment Certificate (EAC) is issued:

- The EAC remains in effect for the life of the project, subject only to suspension or cancellation as applicable. If the project has not substantially started by the deadline specified by the EAO, the EAC expires.
- The Compliance & Enforcement branch of the EAO:
 - conducts compliance inspections of regulated parties and projects,
 - uses enforcement to ensure projects are designed, built, operated and decommissioned or reclaimed.




