This document was prepared by the Impact Assessment Agency of Canada (the Agency) following the planning phase for the Upper Beaver Gold Project (the Project). The purpose of this document is to set out the Agency's preliminary understanding of the potential adverse impacts of the Project on Apitipi Anicinapek Nation's exercise of rights. As additional information becomes available throughout the impact assessment process, this document will be updated.

Summary of Information Available to the Agency about:

- a) Summary of the information available to the Agency related to the nature and extent of Apitipi Anicinapek Nation's Aboriginal and treaty rights:
 - Members of Apitipi Anicinapek Nation have Aboriginal and treaty rights that are recognized and affirmed under section 35 of the *Constitution Act, 1982*.
 - Apitipi Anicinapek Nation is a signatory to Treaty 9, which provides rights to hunting, trapping and fishing throughout the treaty area.
 - Apitipi Anicinapek Nation's reserve is approximately 45 kilometres north-west of the project area.
 - The project area is located within Apitipi Anicinapek Nation's traditional territory.
 - Apitipi Anicinapek Nation is affiliated with Nishnawbe Aski Nation and part of the political sector of the Algonquin Anishinabeg Nation Tribal Council.
- b) Summary of the information available to the Agency on the potential impacts to the exercise of Apitipi Anicinapek Nation's rights resulting from any change to the environment due to the Project:

Potential impacts to physical and cultural heritage

• Potential impacts to ability to revitalize, maintain and transmit their culture.

Potential impacts to the current use of lands and resources for traditional purposes

• Potential changes to the ability of Apitipi Anicinapek Nation members to use the land near to and around the Project (which they have done since time immemorial).

Potential impacts to any structure, site, or thing that is of historical, archeological, pale ontological, or architectural significance
