Subject: Request for Comments on the Potential Impact Assessment of the Proposed Upper Beaver Gold Project

On July 20, 2021, the Impact Assessment Agency of Canada (the Agency) sent a letter to Mattagami First Nation providing early notification about the proposed Upper Beaver Gold Project.

On September 13, 2021, the Agency accepted the Initial Project Description for the Project from Agnico Eagle Mines Limited (the proponent) as meeting the requirements of the *Information and Management of Time Limits Regulations* under the *Impact Assessment Act* (IAA). As of today, the 180-day planning phase of the impact assessment has commenced, thus we are seeking your views on the potential effects of the Project and on your preferences in consultation and engagement approaches.

### **The Proposed Project**

Agnico Eagle Mines Limited is proposing the construction, operation, decommissioning and abandonment of an underground and open pit gold and copper mine located 20 kilometres northeast of Kirkland Lake, in Ontario. As proposed, the project includes an on-site metal mill and structures for diverting water. The maximum ore production capacity of the mine is approximately 15,000 tonnes per day, and the maximum ore input capacity of the processing plant would be approximately 10,000 tonnes per day, with a mine life of approximately 16 years. The Project would require the diversion of over 90 million cubic meters of water per year from Beaverhouse Lake downstream to the Misema River.

# Participation in the impact assessment planning phase

Pursuant to the IAA, the Agency is initiating consultation activities with Indigenous groups, as well as engaging the public and other participants. A public comment period on the summary of the Initial Project Description is taking place from September 13, 2021 to October 4, 2021.

### **Request for comments**

The Agency is seeking your initial views on the following items:

- Any environmental effects and impacts of the Project that are of concern to your community including any anticipated environmental effects and additional impacts that are not listed in the Initial Project Description.
- How the project and associated environmental effects could result in positive or negative changes to your community's:
  - o health conditions (e.g. country foods, drinking water, air quality)
  - socio-economic conditions (e.g. economic development, access to jobs, access to resources);
  - physical and cultural heritage (e.g. ceremonial sites, burial sites, cultural landscapes);
  - current use of lands and resources for traditional purposes (e.g. hunting, fishing, trapping); or,
  - structures, sites or things of historical, archaeological, paleontological or architectural significance (e.g. artifacts, important historical buildings or symbols).
- Any potential impacts of the Project on Mattagami First Nation's exercise of Aboriginal and/or treaty rights as protected under section 35 of the *Constitution Act, 1982*, that are not listed in the Initial Project Description

Comments received by **October 4, 2021** will inform the development of a Summary of Issues prepared by the Agency, which includes the issues raised by Indigenous groups and other participants. The Agency will provide the Summary of Issues to the proponent and post a copy to the Registry. The proponent will be required to submit a Detailed Project Description to the Agency that outlines how it plans to address the issues raised. The proponent's documents and input from Indigenous groups and other participants will then be considered by the Agency in its decision on whether to require a federal impact assessment for the Project.

#### **COVID-19 Pandemic**

The Agency recognizes that it is challenging to undertake meaningful public engagement and Indigenous consultation in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. To ensure the continuity of its operations during the COVID-19 pandemic, the Agency put in place virtual and online mechanisms that have enabled staff to work closely with Indigenous groups and communities, the public, proponents and stakeholders, ensuring that their engagement needs were met as best as possible during this time.

The Agency is continuing to provide virtual options to manage training needs and current public engagement and consultations. Adjustments to assessment timeframes are also being considered on a case-by-case basis and in accordance with the authorities under the IAA. Given the public health advice of federal and provincial authorities, the Agency is still temporarily suspending face-to-face meetings with proponents, stakeholders and community members.

The Agency continues to provide flexibility around its engagement, consultation and training activities, and will reassess in-person meetings once it is safe to do so. Any updates or consultation plans will continue to be posted on the Agency's website and on the Registry.
