Site Layout



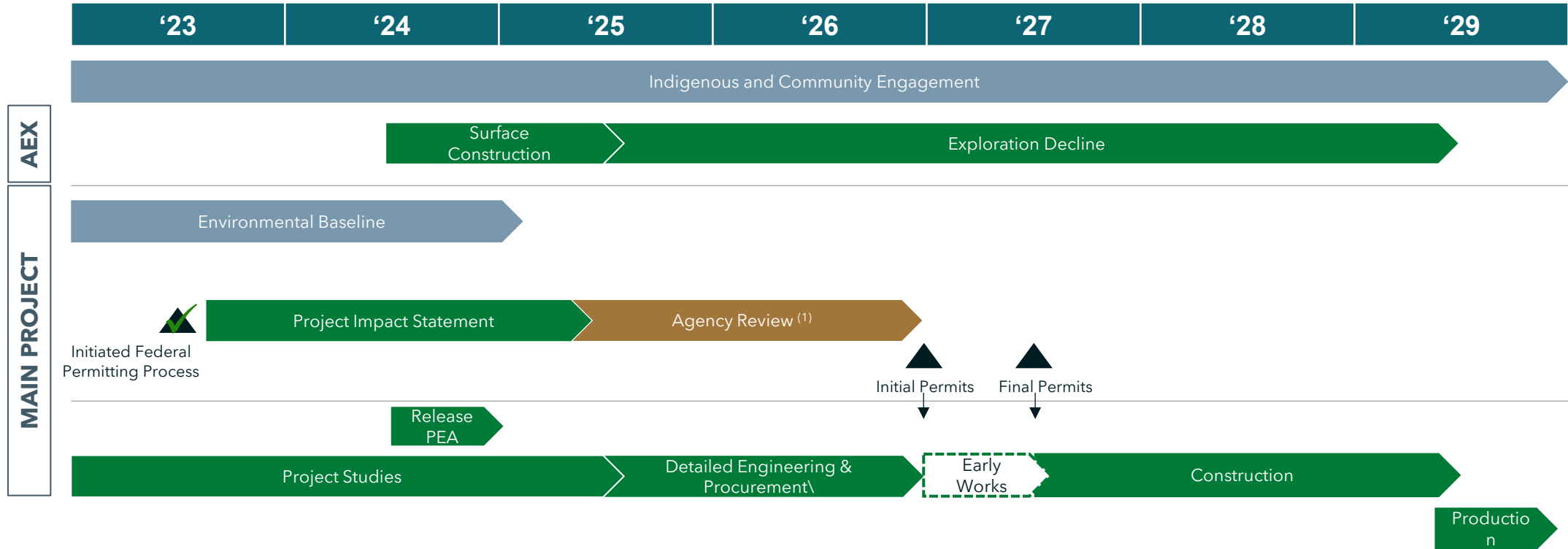

Open House Presentation	<p>-Started by highlighting the honour of working within the area, relations to Indigenous communities, and respecting and recognizing the rights of these Indigenous partners.</p> <p>-Presentation went on to detail the location, resource updates, and plans for the rest of 2024.</p> <p>-Short discussion of Tuzyks road, with KR mentioning that this is still a public access road.</p> <p>-AEX update was given, further discussion of the plans for Federal Approvals for the Main Project. The explanation of Valued Components (VCs) was given, along with details regarding the methodology and alternatives for this project as required for the Impact Statement.</p> <p>-The next steps were proposed, which highlighted future open house topics and meetings with promises to keep community members in the loop via public mail drops, and the Kinross newsletter.</p>	No action needed.
Questions during and after the Presentation	<p>After the Execution Strategy Slide:</p> <p>Q: What is the volume of discharge to the Chukuni?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: The daily discharge will at maximum, be around 1900 m3 daily or 150 m3 an hour. However, it will likely not get that high. <p>Q: What happens if there is a failure at water treatment plant?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: We will have a third pond on site, which will allow for about thirty extra days for any hiccup or failure within the water treatment plan to be noticed and fixed. There's a contingency plan within the plant as it currently stands. The plant is also not typical, as the water is treated all the way to ultrafiltration, which is around one level less than reverse osmosis. 	

	<p>Q: Will the water temperature of the Chukuni be affected by the effluent water?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: No, as this will be discharged at ambient water temperature. <p>Q: Looking to later aspects of the project, will there be a higher volume of water discharged when rock milling is taking place?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: At this point in the project, there has been no rock milling that has occurred, but there will an increase in water volume during this phase. <p>Q: Has any further thought been taken during the milling phase?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: Water will be treated, and the water used will be considered for the entire water balance for the whole site. The discharge for the entire site is 1000 m3 an hour. However, as part of the ongoing evaluation of the Project this will be determined in detail. <p>Q: How long will it be until the milling starts for this project?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: Construction on the main aspect of the project will be taking place starting in 2027, so this will likely start in 2029 if permitting goes as planned. <p>Q: Will the project have an on-site mill or be milled on site?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: As the project currently stands in the Advanced Exploration Phase, we do not have an on-site mill, as the current phase is just to get depth. The milling phase of the project will be further down the line. <p>Q: What will be happening with the exports for the project?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: There will maybe be two months worth of trucks, as there is not a high amount of bulk sample. For AEX, we are currently talking about collecting mineralized rock. There will be local opportunities from a business perspective, as we will either be hauling this to the Evolution complex if they have capacity or holding the concentrate and then ship these via rail to another facility. Once we are further along in the project, we will continue to keep the community in the loop and communicate what the plan will be. <p>End of presentation questions:</p> <p>Q: What is fisheries compensation from the next steps slide?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: This will be in place due to the streams running through the mine rock pile and 	
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	<p>Waterbody 3. There are fishes within these bodies and streams (not game fish), and under regulations, you are not allowed to deposit mine was in fish habitats. We will be creating an equal or better fish habitat where fish will naturally migrate to and give financial support via bond to the Federal Government to ensure that this will be done by Kinross, with the bond provided to the government to be used as backup in previous cases where corporations have failed to do this. Kinross is committed to the creation of a new fish habitat and will gladly pay for it, but the government just takes a bond as a precaution in all cases.</p> <p>Q: Getting back to the pipeline, will it be discharged to Dixie Lake or the Chukuni River?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: Originally, we wanted to send the effluent to Dixie Lake, but the lake was too small to be a receiver as it is more likely to cause impacts due to its smaller size. The government prefers a larger body of water for a receiver. The pipeline will be a six-inch insulated pipeline that will sit above ground, we are not allowed to do collections as we have never applied for approval for anywhere else aside from the Chukuni. <p>Q: Do we have an approximate location for where the pipeline will be entering the Chukuni?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: The pipeline will be following the road and be roughly parallel to the power line. Then it will continue straight where the powerline curves, and cross slightly below the powerline on the same curve of the river. The pipeline will go into the water and in the channel and sit on the bottom of the river system and discharge via a diffuser. There is no evidence of the effluent in the river past 20m of the pipeline due to the high level of treatment which the water will be receiving, and the overall flow of the system. <p>Q: How high off the ground will the pipeline be? Will it have an affect on wildlife in the area?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: The pipeline will be around 6-8 inches off the ground. Wildlife corridors will be implemented, and the pipeline will likely be covered in gravel. <p>Q: Regarding power lines, I am aware of the current power to the mine being temporary, but will we have enough power for all this activity proposed for this mine?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: Currently, we do not have the power for the main mining project. Notice was put out regarding the installation of the temporary power generation for the AEX. We are looking to then 	
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	<p>transition to natural gas, and then hopefully a powerline. The main project is potentially going to have to drastically expand the need for power, likely from Vermillion Bay or Thunder Bay.</p> <p>Q: Why would the power need to come from as far as Vermillion Bay for the main project?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: The generating system in Ear Falls does not generate enough to feed the main project. We would need an additional 50-60MW to what Ear Falls can generate. <p>Q: When the Griffith Mine was operating, there were no power issues. This project sounds similar as there were two lines going to Red Lake. Hydro One shut this line down when the mine closed (1986). When they rehabilitated the Dryden line, insulation extended and they likely doubled the voltage, will something similar happen as well?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: We don't have the answer at this time, and we are currently getting all the information that we can to solve this. <p>Q: Do we have a training project going on?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: For the main project, we are looking at training programs from local institutions specifically, but we will have this conversation further down the line. Kinross is committed to building a capable workforce, and we will not be forgetting the townspeople in this conversation. 	
<p>General Comments</p>	<p>Feedback received:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> This might be outside the scope of what Kinross could do, but there is a greater need for more businesses within the area, and more specifically within Ear Falls. There needs to be more planning done to ensure that there is something to attract people to these projects. Talent should also be a consideration, as bringing talented people on the project will attract more talented people to the area and subsequent project.

	<p>■: How far will the sound of blasting and trucks carry, and which stakeholders are at risk from being affected by this noise?</p> <p>■: Have we engaged with trapline holders ■■■■■■■■■■?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A: We are working on this; we have previously engaged with ■■■■■■■■■■ heavily. <p>Comment after the Stakeholder Map slide was presented:</p> <p>■: The primary residences in the middle of the Eastern Shore on Lake Pakwash is flagged incorrectly as cottages, please note these are primary residences.</p> <p>A: This map will be updated to reflect that these are primary residences. This has been raised internally.</p> <p>Question from after the presentation:</p> <p>■: You said previously that the main project phase will add 1000 m3 to the Chukuni per hour, what is this per second, and how much flow will be added/taken from the Chukuni?</p> <p>A: We wouldn't necessarily be adding this water to the river, as we would be taking it, collecting it and treating it. For comparison and what's typical, the flow added overall will likely be a tenth of a percent. We will get more detailed statistics surrounding the exact flow per second, as we understand that per second is what other mines in the area give.</p> <p>Mac discussion with ■■■■■■■■■■ after the Open House Presentation:</p> <p>-Major question surrounding the finalized volume of water taken/added to the Chukuni, which leads to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Concerns regarding the cranberry bog, muskrats, and beavers. • Questions surrounding the possibility of junction closure. • Will the bridge be affected, concern regarding the bridge and erosion are a main concern. • How will the effluent have an affect on the sediments, and fisheries? • Will the discharge have any effects on northern spawns, will this cause murky water/any other issues? <p>-Question regarding the discharge volume from ■■■■■■■■■■ will need to be addressed, especially considering the downstream burial grounds.</p>

Site Layout



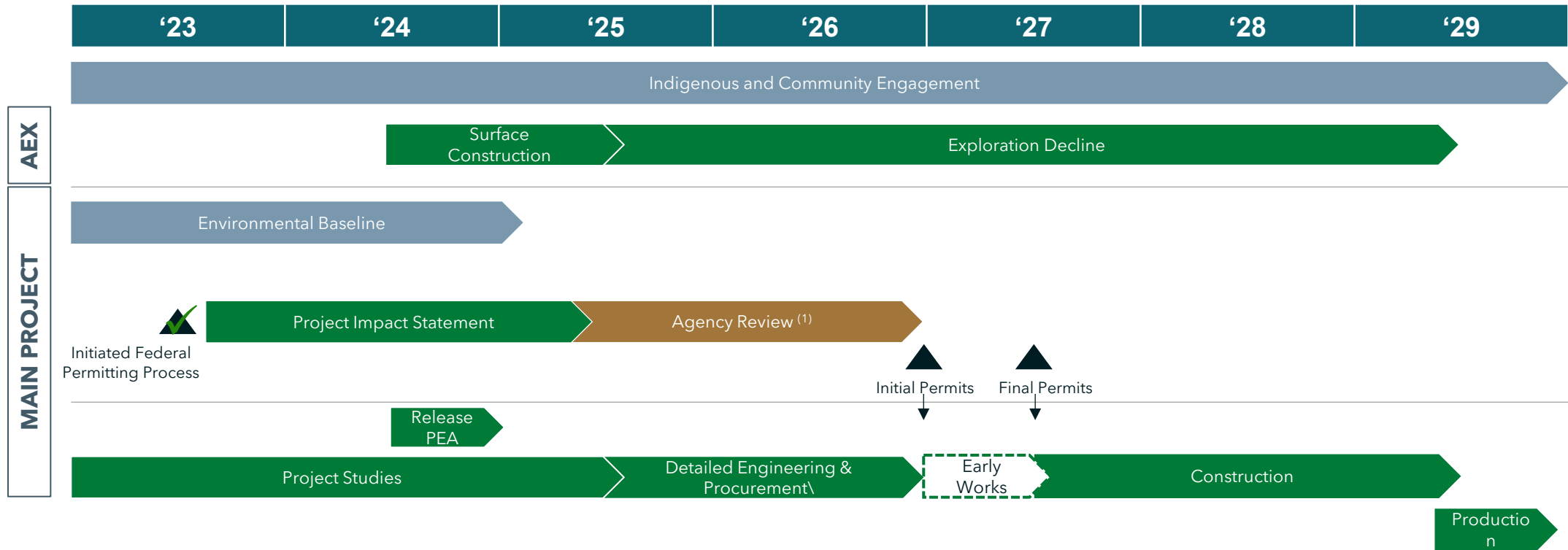

Questions after the presentation:	<p>Q: Did Kinross purchase some more claims?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: We have in the northern margins; we will update this on the map moving forward. <p>Q: Is there going to be milling involved in the project?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: Yes, there will be milling involved with the main project. There is no plan for an on-site mill related to the AEX Project. <p>Q: Regarding the power allotment that was proposed to the IESO, would it just be for AEX or the main project?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: This is for AEX and the main, there is enough power currently for AEX but there's no infrastructure at this time, for future power, we will use both natural gas and hydro, but the power line will need to be updated to support the Main Project. 	

	<p>Q: I'm just trying to find out in terms of manpower, both leading up to, and the main project, what would be some numbers for the people stationed here or coming to the town as someone from the hospital, is there anything we need to do to build capacity?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">A: We do not have exact numbers currently. It will likely be around 140-160 people for the AEX portion. The next big influx will be for the main project and then these numbers will be more substantial, at around 650-1000 people. This is something we will sit down and learn and explore with the municipality, we have started this conversation, but we do not have a concrete number at this time. Going forward we are looking out for community wellbeing in Red Lake and the greater area, we are dedicated to community and the services such as the hospital. Kinross has shown commitment to a strong community relationship, legacy approach, and community investment, throughout other projects, and this will be the case moving forward as well. <p>Q: Are there going to be more hotels or camps or houses built for this project?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">A: In terms of where we're going to house everyone, as it currently stands lots of people are living within the community, we are using existing facilities, and we will not likely be building hotels but for AEX. A supporting camp will be purpose built for AEX. As this project goes and if everything stays consistent, we will need to have a camp. In terms of housing, Red Lake does not have the volume, but in 5 years time this might change. This is a moving target; and we will be working with municipalities. The majority of land surrounding Red Lake is owned by the Crown, so this is not a simple process for growth. We are still exploring the options at this time. <p>Q: What tax base will be servicing?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">A: We are currently in unorganized territory as it stands, but we will likely end up being in a municipality. Which municipality we end up in whether it's EF OR RL expansion is a given, a business process and how we interact we will be business partners. <p>Q: What you're saying is your process in being here is for the community to ask as many questions as we can,</p>	
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	<p>then figure out how you need to go about with this project from this feedback?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: Yes. We need feedback from this community, as this is a substantial operation. We need cooperation, and different ideas. This won't be the only meeting; we will be having a two-way conversation with this community as asked in the question. <p>Q: I read in the newsletter that you are looking to upgrade turning lane for the Tuzyks? What's the timeline and who's paying for this?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: We are well on our way to getting the full permits for these turning lanes, we've had this conversation, and we will be putting in the turning lanes. The cost for one is the same as two, but this will improve safety in the area. We have enough traffic for this to be justified, and it will cost peanuts as opposed to the possible safety cost. Kinross will be paying for this. <p>Q: What's the reasoning behind incorporating these turn lanes?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: There was an incident previously with a fuel truck turning, no one harmed but preventing any further incidents and improving safety is the motivation behind building these turning lanes. <p>Q: What's the expected noise level going to be throughout AEX and the main project, specifically for those in and around the Pakwash?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: We set up noise monitoring over the past two years, we are expected to keep this down to the minimum, and there are regulations we are conscious of. This will be a concern going forward and we will have the answer later. 	
<p>Further Feedback:</p>	<p>I know we are providing feedback as well; I think it would help if the Government would attend these to get a feel of community concerns.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A: That would be nice, fair question but we document it, and this gets sent over to the agencies, they can be challenging at times, but this project is a clear priority.

2. Minutes

a. Opening Remarks

- Great Bear staff opened the meeting with introductions and a land acknowledgment. An overview of the meeting agenda and key discussion points followed.

b. Advanced Exploration (AEX) and Site Development

- Great Bear provided an update on AEX, emphasizing its temporary nature and the continued advancement of facilities.

Q: What kind of lights are being installed in the open pit and around the site?

- Great Bear response spoke to studies and baseline conditions noting the rural setting. Great Bear staff also noted outlined mitigation measures, including angling, site views, and overall waste rock site considerations.
- In designing the main mine project, we are considering options in terms of technology, lighting, angles, equipment. It is still in the early stages, and these options are still being considered. Encouraged to continue to reach out with questions.
- Reference made to a previous email sent regarding this issue, with a request for a response from GBR.

c. Main Project Overview

- Kinross Great Bear provided an overview of the main project, highlighting long-term potential and opportunities.

- Discussion of the Tailings Management Facility, thickened tailings and desulphurization processes, and key mitigative measures implemented to date, including the Viggo Pit and water treatment.
 - Workforce considerations, camp numbers, and water management/treatment approach were outlined.
 - Great Bear addressed the project timeline, emphasizing that while challenges exist, the timeline remains reasonable and achievable.
- d. Federal Permitting and Environmental Considerations
- Kinross Great introduced the federal permitting process.
 - Highlighted advancements in tailings technology and dam improvements.
 - Discussed Viggo co-disposal and ultrafiltration, referencing stakeholder feedback.
 - Kinross Great Bear provided detailed overview of Valued Components (VCs), including breakdown on reasoning and approach for the Federal VCs (fVCs) and Pathway VCs (pVCs), as part of the scoping process.
- e. Kinross Great Bear provided detailed overview of Valued Components (VCs), including breakdown on reasoning and approach for the Federal VCs (fVCs) and Pathway VCs (pVCs), as part of the scoping process.
- Overview of Navigable Waters considerations and potential usage aspects.
 - Emphasis on mitigation measures and watershed-based design, including considerations for Dixie and Rice Lake. Great Bear invited community input regarding potential concerns and local knowledge.
- f. Discussion on alternatives, effects assessment, and the anticipated June timeline for closure-related discussions.

Q: What was the MECP question or appeal filed?

- Kinross Great Bear explained the challenge related to the Permit to Take Water (PTTW) for construction. Clarified why Kinross applied for the permit, specifically for ponds and the boxcut area. Great Bear staff spoke to the Environmental Bill of Rights (EBR) process, appeal proceedings, and the current stay in place.
- Noted that Kinross Great Bear is operating above the relevant water level, creating challenges but not impacting the critical path for AEX. Commitment to resolving the matter to advance pond development.

g. Community Relations and Contributions

- Great Bear provided an update on community relations efforts, including donations to healthcare initiatives, local organizations, and Lakehead University. Great Bear team also highlighted the availability of sign-in forms, feedback collection methods, and informational poster boards placed in the recreation room.

Q: Where will the water for processing come from?

- The Chukuni River will serve as the primary water source for both AEX and the main project.

Q: How much water will be recycled from the plant?

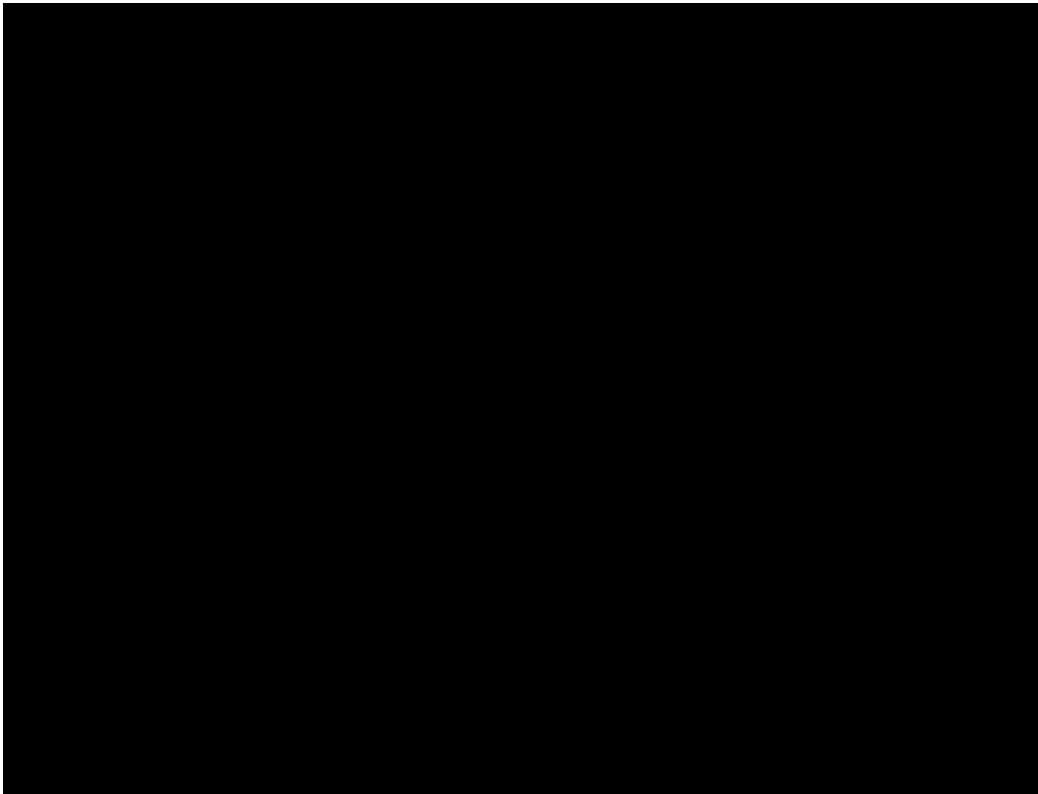
- Most of the water used will be recycled, with the Chukuni River serving as a supplementary source.
- Kinross Great Bear emphasized the net positive water balance, noting that water taken from the Chukuni is primarily for pump operations.

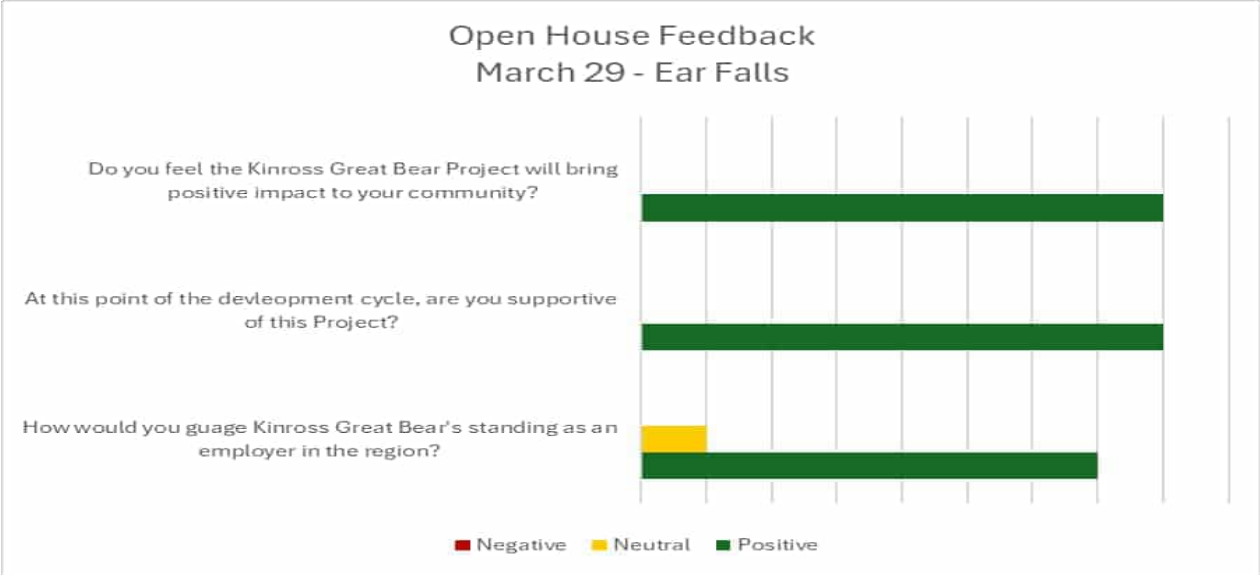

2024 Recap

- Mid-year in 2024, Kinross announced Great Bear's mineral resource estimate, including approximately 2.7 Mts. of measured and indicated resources and approximately 3.9 Mts. of inferred resources.
- These results continue to support the view of a high-grade, large, long-life mining complex in Great Bear.
- Kinross Great Bear released its Preliminary Economic Assessment in September 2024.
- For the AEX program, early work, including test drilling and geophysics, has commenced.
- The Company is focused on progressing AEX activities including construction of the exploration vehicle planned to commence in late 2025.
- Currently working through detailed engineering for the main mine project.

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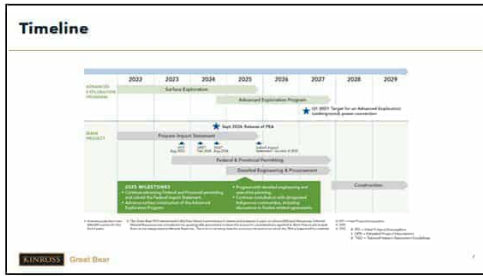

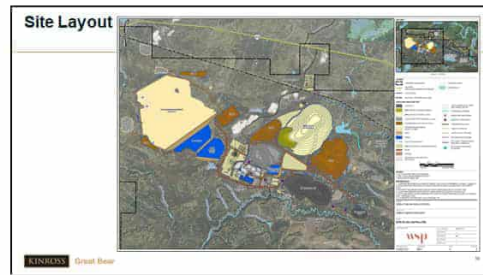

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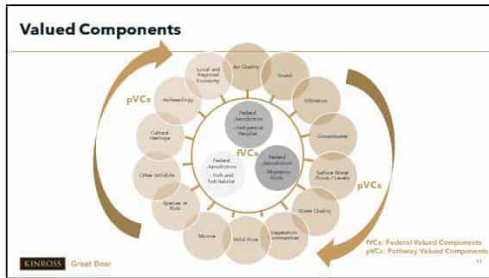

2. Minutes

a. Opening Remarks

- Great Bear staff opened the meeting with introductions and a land acknowledgment. An overview of the meeting agenda and key discussion points followed.

b. Advanced Exploration (AEX) and Site Development

- Great Bear provided an update on AEX, emphasizing its temporary nature and the continued advancement of facilities. Noted that phasing and site changes will be presented at the next meeting as AEX build continues to evolve. Great Bear noted that target for decline development is November 2025.
- Great Bear provided an update on the 2025 status and an overview of current staging.

c. Main Project Overview

- Kinross Great Bear provided an overview of the main project, highlighting long-term potential and opportunities.
- Discussion of the Tailings Management Facility, thickened tailings and desulphurization processes, and key mitigative measures implemented to date, including the Viggo Pit and water treatment.
- Workforce considerations, camp numbers, and water management/treatment approach were outlined.
- A local comparison was made by Great Bear to regional operations to provide additional context for those attending.

- d. Federal Permitting and Environmental Considerations
 - Kinross Great introduced the federal permitting process.
 - Highlighted advancements in tailings technology and dam improvements.
 - Discussed Viggo co-disposal and ultrafiltration, referencing stakeholder feedback.
 - Kinross Great Bear provided detailed overview of Valued Components (VCs), including breakdown on reasoning and approach for the Federal VCs (fVCs) and Pathway VCs (pVCs), as part of the scoping process.
- e. Kinross Great Bear provided detailed overview of Valued Components (VCs), including breakdown on reasoning and approach for the Federal VCs (fVCs) and Pathway VCs (pVCs), as part of the scoping process.
 - Overview of Navigable Waters considerations and potential usage aspects.
 - Emphasis on mitigation measures and watershed-based design, including considerations for Dixie and Rice Lake. Great Bear invited community input regarding potential concerns and local knowledge.
- f. Discussion on alternatives, effects assessment, and the anticipated June timeline for closure-related discussions.
- g. Community Relations and Contributions
 - Great Bear provided an update on community relations efforts, including donations to healthcare initiatives, local organizations, and Lakehead University. Great Bear team also highlighted the availability of sign-in forms, feedback collection methods, and informational poster boards placed in the room.

Q: It seems Kinross has performed extensive baseline studies and assessments for the Federal government. Does the government do their own monitoring activities or does the government make a judgement based on the information provided by Kinross? Does the government have the expertise to make that judgement?

- Great Bear stated that the Crown does not conduct parallel monitoring. explained that the Federal Government has the mandate and qualifications to review the work but does not duplicate Kinross's process.
- Highlighted ongoing collaboration with all levels of the project. Great Bear noted the use of third-party subject matter experts in data collection, emphasizing their professional designations.
- Great Bear closed highlighting compliance considerations at all levels of the government from an operational perspective.

Q: Does national security factor into the project assessment, particularly regarding global stability and economic impacts?

- Kinross Great Bear stated that political and global stability considerations are not included in the assessment. Great Bear staff noted that the assessment focuses on social, environmental, Indigenous health, and overall benefits for Canadians.
- Noted that Environment Canada is keen to advance projects under current geopolitical climate.

Q: What are the housing and camp plans? Will there be opportunities to grow the community?

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- Great Bear addressed housing considerations, emphasizing a commitment to evaluating land acquisition and sustainable housing efforts.
- Stated that Kinross Great Baer aims to collaborate with local municipalities to promote sustainable growth.
- Highlighted Kinross’s approach to legacy development and workforce attraction at other operations and applying that same approach here.

Q: What is the capacity of the powerline infrastructure?

- Kinross Great Bear outlined the power approach and project phasing. Noted significant constraints on the existing power line. Referenced the importance of the IESO report in supporting Hydro One’s decision-making, Great Bear noted current approach to power as detailed noting that we are actively working with regional parties to advance this dialogue, but this is separate from the current proposed Project.

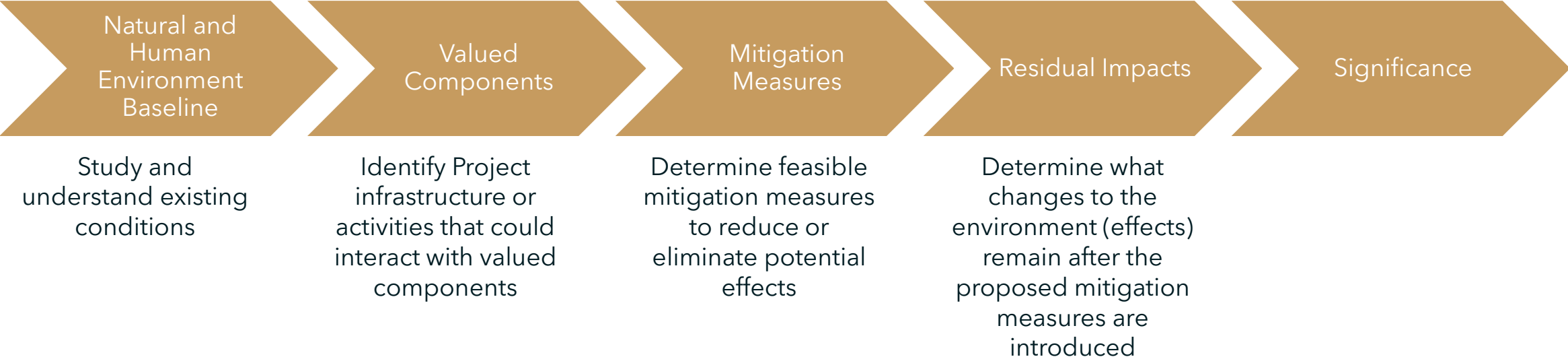

Additional Considerations

- **Fish Habitat Impacts and Offsetting**

- The project will result in some impacts to fish and fish habitat.
- The proposed project is expected to impact approx. 20 ha of fish habitat.
- To offset these impacts, Kinross Great Bear must create new or enhance existing fish habitat.

- **Species at Risk & Species of Interest**

- Canada's Species at Risk Act, 2002 (SARA) and Ontario's Endangered Species Act, 2007 (ESA) provide legal protection for species at risk and their habitats within Ontario and across Canada
- These Acts protect individuals and habitats of endangered and threatened species by making it illegal to damage or destroy their habitat.
- Development activities that may impact Species at Risk or their habitats require a permit.

- **Closure Planning**

- Closure Planning is governed primarily by the Ontario *Mining Act* and associated Codes.
- The *Mining Act* requires a Closure Plan be certified to the mine Rehabilitation Code by qualified professionals .
- Great Bear Resources' is planning for the closure of the site now and looking for opportunities for progressive reclamation.
- Prior to mine-related disturbance Great Bear Resources will be required to provide financial assurance to the government.

Kinross Great Bear – Ear Falls Open House Meeting

1. Executive Summary

The meeting opened with welcomes, introductions, a Land Acknowledgement, an agenda overview, and notice of next week’s Effects Workshop. Updates were provided on exploration work, including ongoing drilling and plans for continued activity into 2026. The AEX site is progressing well, with camp operations underway and early-site development advancing. Participants asked questions about timelines, contractors, hiring, community impacts, and permitting, and the team clarified expected schedules, including mid-2026 blasting and major construction beginning in 2027.

An overview of the main mine project highlighted its planned layout, expected production levels, employment opportunities, and continued permitting and engineering work. Environmental updates covered progress on the Impact Statement and upcoming Effects workshops. Community Relations reviewed recent engagement, partnerships, and support initiatives in the region. The session closed with discussion on community involvement, workforce development, future opportunities, and coordination on services and infrastructure.

Community members asked about the timing of the first blast, contractor involvement with Redpath, hiring timelines in light of layoffs, and how long the camp will remain in place. They inquired about impacts on local residents, potential tax implications, overall project timelines, and progress on the regional hydro line. Questions were raised about tailings proximity to waterbodies, environmental safety, federal support for mining, expected first production, bulk sampling plans, and mill development. Additional questions focused on youth engagement, local training and career pathways, economic opportunities for the communities, supply chain and vendor potential, the role of the Chukuni Community Development Corporation, road conditions, and coordination with emergency services as activity increases.

Q: How late in 2026 for the first blast?

A: We are planning for Mid-2026

Q: Does Redpath have the underground mining contract for AEX?

A: Yes

Q: With the layoffs, will they start hiring sooner?

A: Once contractors are ready to start work, we expect they will do community outreach.

Q: How long is the AEX camp going to be there?

A: Duration of the project, minimum 4 years.

Q: What happens with the people that are locals, how does camp affect that?

A: Kinross has a commitment to grow the communities of Red Lake and Ear Falls. The Project will have a camp to house contractors and some rotational workers. The existing AEX camp houses some contractors, but it is not full. Additionally, some contractors are renting in the communities also. The longer-term goal is to hire locally or attract workers to relocate to the communities.

Q: Ear Falls residents are hopeful additional residents will help lower taxes.

A: Kinross is still in the permitting stages for the main project.

Q: Will it be 12 years until you open?

A: No, the main mine project is expected to go into production in 2029/2030 and will have 12 years of operation. The construction phase will start in 2027. We anticipate the hiring process for the main mine to occur in 2027/2028, pending required permits.

Q: The community has heard that Hydro One is working on developing an additional power supply from Dryden to Red Lake. Do you know how long this is expected to take?

A: Kinross is not leading this project, but from our understanding we expect to see this project realized in 2031, at the earliest.

Additional community comments were made about the length of time it seems to take to advance key infrastructure projects and the urgency for the power project.

Main Mine Overview

- GBR has tried to limit impacts through a compact layout for the proposed open pit and UG mine.
- Initial life of 12 years, GBR believes it will continue beyond that timeframe.
- 10,000 tonnes per day
- Annual gold production of 300-500,000 oz
- GBR will have a state-of-the-art water treatment facility
- GBR noted 700-1100 workers employed when in operation
- GBR has started the procurement for large equipment
- Federal permitting is ongoing for the Main Mine Project
- Phase 1 of the Impact Statement has been submitted
- Main construction can be started once Federal and Provincial permits have been received.

Q: How far is the Tailings Facility from the closest waterbody?

A: Gullrock Lake is approx. 6km. Dixie Creek is in close proximity to the project area.

Q: Is there a potential for issues with the Tailings Facility being in close proximity to water?

A: The tailings facilities for the main mine are being engineered to ensure they are safe for communities and the environment.

Q: The current Canadian political climate means the Federal government is looking to expedite mining projects, does the Great Bear Project intend to take advantage?

A: Kinross hopes to have the Great Bear Project admitted into the One Project, One Process stream. We are hopeful this could help to provide efficiencies with Provincial permitting. This will not impact consultation requirements with impacted Indigenous communities.

Q: When is first production scheduled?

A: The project is scheduled to move into production and first gold pour near the end of 2029.

Q: As a part of AEX, are there plans to take a bulk sample, and, if so, when?

A: Yes, we intend to take a bulk sample for the AEX program and we hope to achieve that in Q2/Q3 2027

Q: Are you working on designing a mill now?

A: Great Bear is currently working on designing a mill for the main mine.

Environmental:

- GBR is currently between step 2 and 3 of the impact assessment process and is currently preparing its Impact Statement for submission.
- GBR has chosen to submit the impact statement in phases. The first phase was submitted in September, Phase 2 is scheduled for submission in December, and Phase 3 and final submission is scheduled for Q1 2026. Once submitted, these documents are publicly posted for comment.
- “Some of the things we heard” at previous meetings and from ongoing dialogue was reviewed.
- Provided an overview of the identified Valued Components.
- GBR advised of an Effects Workshop for communities next week, which will include general effects, as well as fish habitat offsetting, species at risk, and closure planning.

Community Relations

- Slide showing all Ear Falls and Red Lake engagements since February 2022 until today.
- GBR has contributed ~\$150,000 in local donations and sponsorships in 2025.
- Scholarships and Bursaries – 5 local scholarships for \$2,000 each, renewable for 4 years.

Comment: There are a lot of local people anxiously waiting for these jobs to become available.

Q: Is Great Bear engaging with local youth, specifically high school students?

A: Great Bear works with local elementary and secondary schools to educate them on future roles in mining, specifically the Great Bear Project. Recently we hosted a group of grade 12 students at the AEX site to teach them about Project Management. We are very supportive of those types of opportunities.

Comment: Youth are used to their parents working in the mines, they need to think of mining differently.

A: Yes, it's our job to help youth see mining differently and understand the opportunities it offers. We start even before high school, working with the Grade 7/8 Pathways program to introduce students to mining careers.

Q: How can the communities help Kinross?

A: We're in regular communication with both mayors and councils. Being between two communities means opportunities will extend beyond direct mine jobs.

Comment: you can see it's already busy around town, even with what's going on now.

Q: What's the condition of the road going in there?

A: The Tuzyk's Road is a standard forestry road and is currently public access.

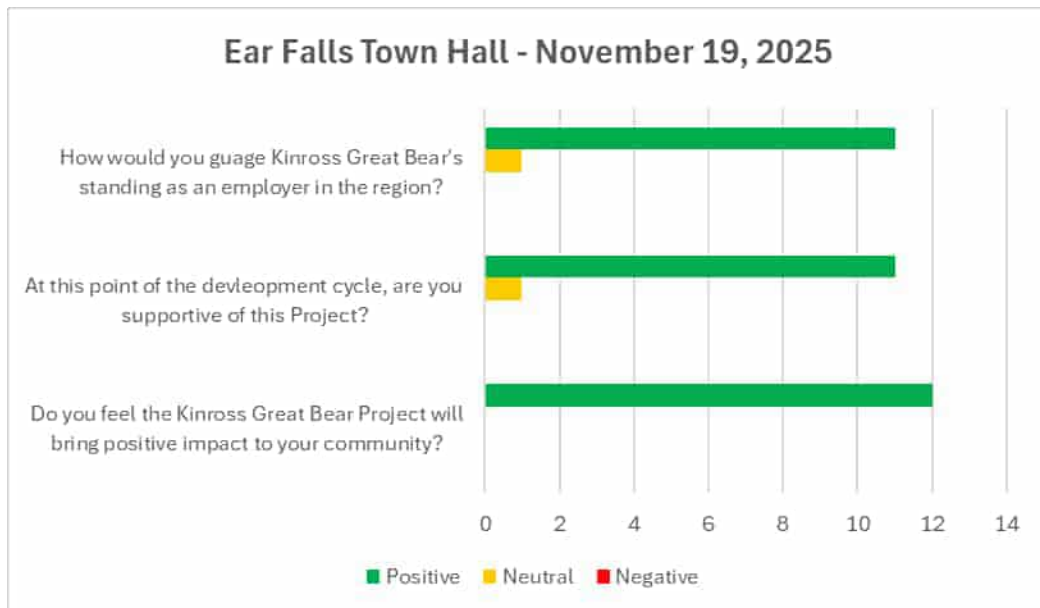
Q: Highway 105 is going to get busier. Are you having conversations with area Emergency Services?

A: We recently hosted the Ear Falls Fire Department, OPP, Red Lake Fire, Mine Rescue, and EMS at the AEX Site to start those conversations. We understand a collaborative approach will be critical.

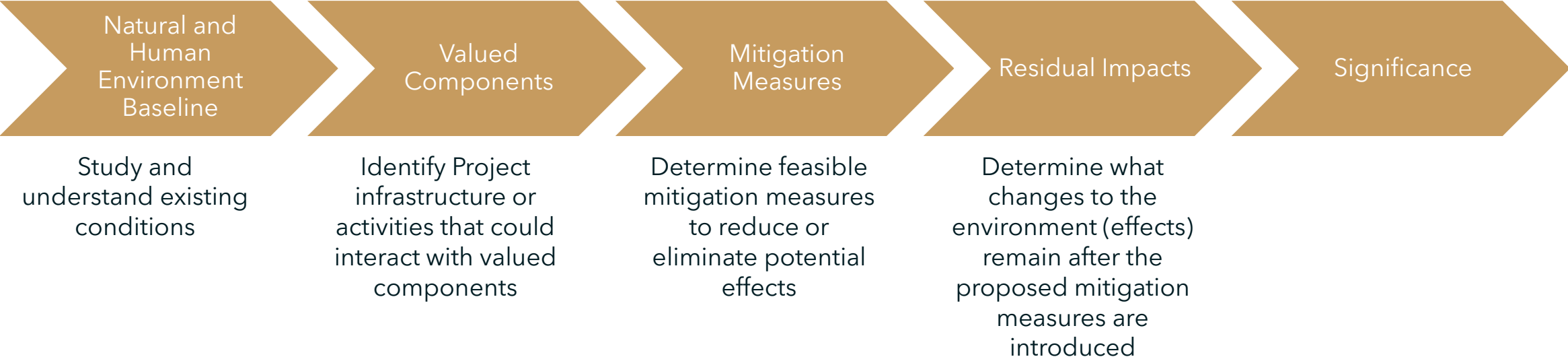
- **Valued Components** frame the assessment of the Project's potential impacts on both the biophysical and human environment with special attention given to aspects under Federal jurisdiction.
- **Pathway Valued Components** encompass a wide range of considerations, including terrestrial and aquatic ecology, water resources, vegetation, the physical environment, human well-being, community development, and Indigenous peoples.

Effects Assessment

- The Impact Assessment considers spatial and temporal boundaries. Separate study areas will be defined for pathway and federal pathway and federal valued components. Impacts to the biophysical environment will generally occur closer to the Project while human environment impacts may occur more broadly.



Additional Considerations

- **Fish Habitat Impacts and Offsetting**
 - The project will result in some impacts to fish and fish habitat.
 - The proposed project is expected to impact approx. 20 ha of fish habitat.
 - To offset these impacts, Kinross Great Bear must create new or enhance existing fish habitat.
- **Species at Risk & Species of Interest**
 - Canada's Species at Risk Act, 2002 (SARA) and Ontario's Endangered Species Act, 2007 (ESA) provide legal protection for species at risk and their habitats within Ontario and across Canada
 - These Acts protect individuals and habitats of endangered and threatened species by making it illegal to damage or destroy their habitat.
 - Development activities that may impact Species at Risk or their habitats require a permit.
- **Closure Planning**
 - Closure Planning is governed primarily by the Ontario *Mining Act* and associated Codes.
 - The *Mining Act* requires a Closure Plan be certified to the mine Rehabilitation Code by qualified professionals .
 - Great Bear Resources' is planning for the closure of the site now and looking for opportunities for progressive reclamation.
 - Prior to mine-related disturbance Great Bear Resources will be required to provide financial assurance to the government.

Closing

Community Relations

Summary:

The meeting opened with introductions, land acknowledgements, and an overview of the agenda, followed by an update on the upcoming Effects Workshop. The team reported that approximately 50,000 meters of drilling is planned across the property, supported by five diamond drills, with over one million meters already completed. Questions addressed included confirmation of condemnation drilling, the location of BTU claims, the current inferred resource estimate of 6.5 million ounces, and expectations that 2025 drilling will not yet increase the resource.

The Advanced Exploration (AEX) program is progressing, with camp operations underway, security in place, and major infrastructure—including a 12-km pipeline and the water treatment plant—moving toward completion. The decline is expected to begin blasting in 2026, pending permits. Questions focused on natural gas use and future hydro power availability.

For the Main Mine, the company outlined a compact open-pit and underground design with an initial 12-year life, 10,000-tpd throughput, and 300–500k oz annual production. A state-of-the-art water treatment facility and substantial local employment are planned. The federal impact assessment continues, with Phase 1 submitted and further phases upcoming. Questions ranged from camp size and procurement timelines to community benefits, municipal taxation, permit delays, transportation, and technology.

Environmental updates noted progress through the Impact Statement phases and preparation for next week's Effects Workshop. Community relations highlights included dozens of engagements and significant contributions to local initiatives, scholarships, and partnerships. Looking ahead to 2026, the team expects to advance detailed engineering, major procurement, and community-based workforce planning. Additional questions addressed blasting timelines, the 1 Project 1 Process framework, and ore grades across the project and other Kinross operations.

A: Yes

Q: Where is BTU located?

A: the BTU claims, held by BTU Metals, but being drilled by Great Bear, are located at the bottom of the Great Bear permit boundary

Q: What is the number of resources inferred?

A: 6.5 million ounces

Q: Has drilling on the property in 2025 increased the resource?

A: The goal is to find something new on the property this year, and to get to a level of technical confidence in what it is. We do not expect to have a resource addition from the work this year.

AEX:

- AEX is progressing well – camp is open and natural gas pipeline in commission
- Security Team consists of 2 people, 24/7 site access security – permitter and road patrolling has started
- Water treatment plant is fully enclosed, fully built, in the process of installing infrastructure
- We have installed the 12km pipeline along the Right of Way from the AEX Site to Chukuni River discharge location.
- Completion of our box cut
- We expect to start blasting the decline in 2026, pending the receipt of necessary permits.
- Currently any delays we are experiencing on AEX will not affect the main mine project timeline

Q: What can you tell us about the hydro project?

A: AEX is currently powered by natural gas generators. A new line has been approved by IESO to expand supply from Dryden. For the main mine, we intend to transition to hydro as it becomes available.

A community member expressed their interest in the 1P1P process.

Q: How much natural gas are you going to use and does Kinross foresee any issues?

A: Unsure of the exact volume, we will eventually get to a state where we will only need a certain amount of natural gas. Power will not just be for GBR, but also for the northwest region.

Main Mine Overview

- GBR has tried to limit the impact of the site with the compact layout size, which is a proposed open pit and UG mine.
- Initial life of 12 years, GBR believes it will continue beyond that timeframe.
- 10,000 tonnes per day
- Annual gold production of 300-500 thousand oz
- GBR will have a state-of-the-art water treatment facility. This will include desulphurization and thickened tailings. The thickened tailings will reduce the amount of water stored and increases the stability of the dams.
- GBR noted 700-1100 workers employed when in operation
- GBR has started the procurement of large equipment
- The Federal Impact Assessment process is ongoing for the Main Mine Project.
- Phase 1 of the Impact Statement has been submitted.
- Main construction can be started once Federal and Provincial permits have been received.

Q: How big of a camp will you have?

A: During operation the camp is planned to accommodate around 300 people, however during the approximate 3-year construction phase the camp will accommodate up to 1,000 workers.

Q: During procurement, are you encouraging businesses to set up warehouses in our community?

A: Yes. Given the scale of our operations, some companies have already shown interest and may eventually set up shops or warehouses locally.

Q: What sort of wait times are you expecting for big equipment?

A: We just started major procurement and we are expecting long-lead items to take between 2.5 to 3 years. We are also looking at including vendor engineering as a part of these larger equipment packages.

Q: I've been watching the Greenstone operation, is that similar to Great Bear?

A: It is similar in the sense that both will be open pit operations, however GBR Will also include underground operations.

Q: How will the Great Bear Project revitalize local communities?

A: Kinross as a company has really high standards and a strong focus on community and Indigenous relations to ensure our operation is leaving a positive impact on communities.

Q: The town was trying to annex the property so Kinross will pay municipal taxes?

A: Currently, Ear Falls and Red Lake have not moved forward with that process. Even though we don't land within either community, we are committed to engaging with and benefiting both communities.

Q: Has the project stalled or stopped because of opposition to permits?

A: The delays are with the Provincial Government. Our ECA and PTTW are currently still pending, – however we are still able to do some work without the specific permits.

Q: Do you expect the Main Mine to be approved by the Government and First Nations communities or is there expected to be additional opposition?

A: We are currently in the Impact Assessment process and have not yet initiated permitting for the main mine.

Q: Have you laid people off?

A: No.

Q: Are you going to build admin buildings on site?

A: Yes, we will have administrative buildings at Site, but we are also exploring options to maintain an office space in Red Lake as well.

Q: Are there going to be buses to provide employee transportation to the Mine from surrounding communities?

A: This is an option we are considering, but No decision has been made.

Q: We have an established community with many mines. Why does it take reinventing the wheel for an operation that is going to use the same processes as other operations in the area

A: Some processes have changed, technology continues to change. There are many factors and it is important we do our due diligence. Our water treatment facility, for example, is leading edge technology..

Environmental:

- GBR is currently between phase 2 and 3 right now for the Impact Statement.

- Phase 1 of the Impact Statement was submitted in September, Phase 2 is scheduled to be submitted in December, and Phase 3 in Q1 2026. These are all currently or will eventually be publicly posted on the Impact Assessment agency website and available for public comment.
- “Some of the things we heard” was discussed
- Valued Components were discussed
- GBR advised of an Effects Workshop scheduled for next week, which will also include fish habitat offsetting, species at risk, and closure planning.

Community Relations

- Slide showing all Ear Falls and Red Lake engagements since February 2022 until today.
- GBR has contributed ~\$150,000 in local donations and sponsorships in 2025.
- Scholarships and Bursaries program – 5 local scholarships for \$2,000 each, renewable for 4 years.

- 5 Year partnership with Lakehead University \$500,000 supporting NOHFC
- Freshwater Conservation Canada partnership – for restoration and rehabilitation of Lake Trout in Red Lake.

2026

- Detailed engineering and major equipment procurement for main project
- Community planning – discussions of what the community can expect and work together on.
- Workforce Planning Survey was introduced. Great Bear is looking to get a sense of local interest in future job opportunities and we are encouraging residents to complete the survey. QR code presented.
- “What We Heard” was discussed

Q: When is the first blast for the Advanced Exploration program?

A: Mid 2026 for first blast associated with the AEX decline and the contract has been awarded to Redpath.

Q: Is there an opportunity for the Great Bear Project to be included in the 1 Project, 1 Process (1P1P) and will this help fast-track the project?

A: Great Bear has started the process of applying for 1P1P designation and are hopeful we will fall under this process for the main mine project. The 1P1P framework is designed to streamline regulatory reviews by creating a single, coordinated process rather than separate, siloed assessments. This approach reduces duplication and improves efficiency, but it does not shorten or bypass critical steps. Importantly, it does not diminish our commitment to meaningful consultation with First Nations, communities, and stakeholders. Engagement will remain thorough, transparent, and ongoing throughout the permitting process.

Q: What's the grade of ore for this project?

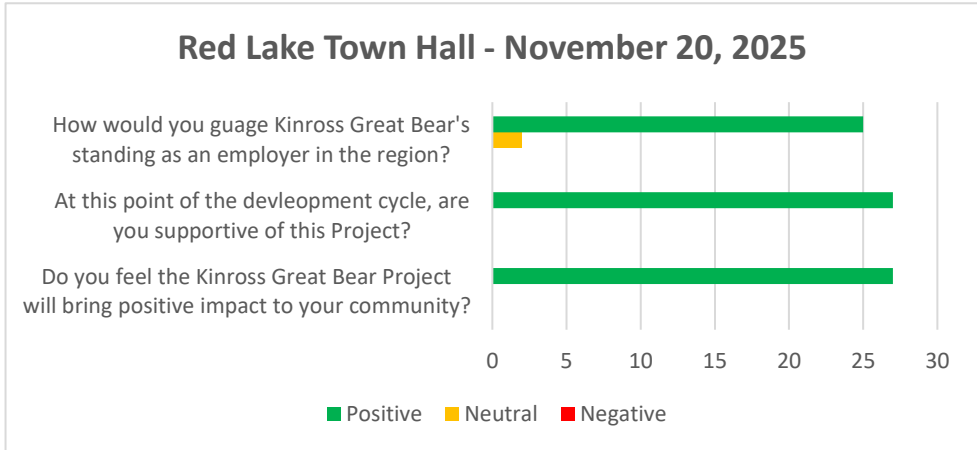
A: Average grade is 5 g/t for underground, a little over 3 g/t in the open pit. It is 0.4g/t in the US at some Kinross sites.

Q: What's the grade at Paracatu?

A: Also 0.4 g/t and Alaska is 0.25 g/t.

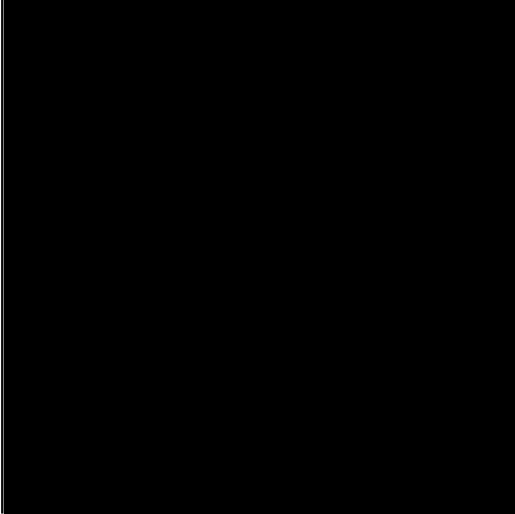

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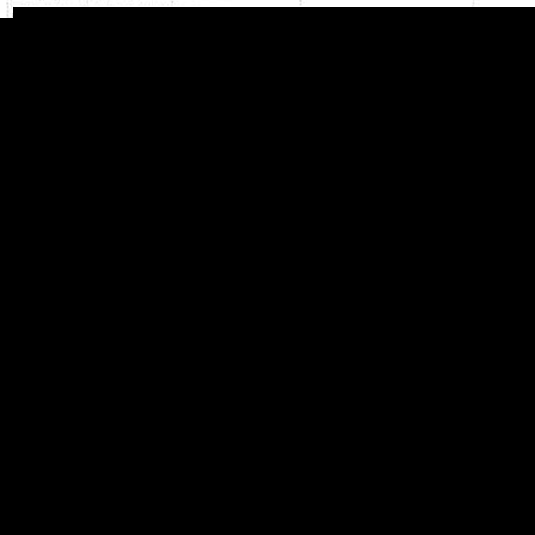

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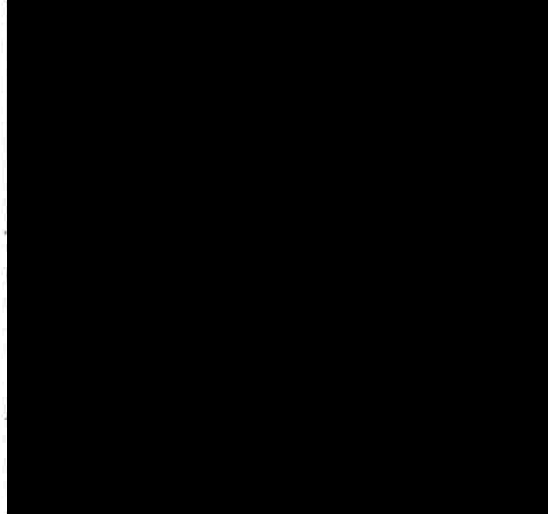
